### About Chance for Children

Founded in 2011, Chance for Children (CFC) is committed to eliminating disparities in child education caused by family income inequalities and to breaking the cycle of poverty for generations to come.

#### What we do

CFC provides the children (1<sup>st</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> grade) in poverty with Study Coupons redeemable at out-of school educational facilities, such tutoring schools, arts & crafts, music, sports, and nature program providers. With over 1700 educational facilities participating in this program throughout Japan, the children can have a variety of choices to fulfill their own interests and needs. To support children to help meet their full potential, college student volunteers consult with the children on a regular bases. CFC relies on private philanthropy to fundraise for its Coupon program.

# **1**. Organization History





- As a small project, Chance for Children started in 2009. College students volunteered to collect street donations to help children in need.

### COVID-19 Survey: Impact on Family Income (2021)

- 90% of disadvantaged families has seen or will see their income decrease due to COVID-19.
- 16% of families' income was reduced over a half in 2020, compared to 2019.

### Voices of the families (2021)



Last year, my salary was slashed in half. For my son, it was difficult to stay motivated, due to a long-lasting school closure. As a result, his grades have kept going down.

After school opened, my child could not manage to attend classes, and eventually stopped going to school at all. Therefore, most of the 8<sup>th</sup> grade learning is unfinished.

With our family income being reduced, we faced many hardships, and started more quarrels. We got divorced, forcing our children go though difficult experiences. They could not focus on study at times, and their academic performance has declined.

My child has a learning disorder, which makes it hard for her to keep up on study. In addition to that, during school closure, the school gave many writing assignments that my child is not good at. Even after the school opened, they tried to cover same curriculum in a shorter time. My child could not keep up with the fast pace, and found out that school didn't provide any supplementary classes for needed students. Only way is to go to cram schools. We are at loss.

# 3. CFC's answer to stop the chain of poverty



### CFC provides Study Coupons to children (1-12<sup>th</sup> grade) in poverty. Vouchers can be used for any educational activities outside of school.



<u>Point 3</u> The problem of stigma (social exclusion) can be reduced.



### **Brothers & Sisters**

- College Student Volunteers, aka Brothers & Sisters, periodically communicates with children via video or phone calls for support.
- ✓ As a role model close in age, Brothers & Sisters give children advice on their everyday lives, study, or future path and ensure that children use the coupons for their best interest.

### Message from the children (1)



It was around the end of school year (March) and I was 8<sup>th</sup> grade when the Covid-19 started in Japan. Soon after, my school closed temporarily. During the closure, I did some school assignments and studied by myself. However, to be honest, I could not figure out exactly how much and which areas I should study for the high-school entrance exam preparation. Regrettably time went by. When school re-opened, I found out that my friends have continued to study virtually with the cram school they belong to during the school closure, and as a result, our academic levels widen apart. I was worried that I would not make it to any high school.

I am very grateful for the Study Vouchers that I received from Chance for Children. I quickly signed up for a sample class of a cram school that I wanted to join. In the class, they taught me how to solve the problems that I could not answer by myself. The school President explained about the entrance exam, and what I should do now to prepare for it. All my experiences alleviated my worries and motivated me to study harder. With my sincere thanks for the opportunities that I am able to learn, I would definitely succeed to enter a high school of my choice and become a person who is capable of supporting others someday.



### Message from the children (2)



I am in 9<sup>th</sup> grade, and will take a high school entrance exam next year. I am planning to use Chance for Children's (CFC) Study Vouchers to go to a cram school for exam preparation.

The reason I applied to the Covid-19 Emergency Children Support Fund at CFC was because the pandemic has affected my father's company and made it financially unstable with less revenue. Unable to afford, I was thinking of quitting my cram school that would help improve my English, which is my weakest subject. Then I received the information about the Fund from my school, and I decided to apply. Now as I am able to continue studying at a cram school, I should be able to put my best efforts into studying to enter my first-choice high school next year.
